


Gayle Methodist Chapel 10.30 am on Friday 18th April 2025

Ready for the years ahead - Stephanie Durnant

Everyone at St Oswald's is very excited about the completion of the work to the tower. The project has been running for more years than most can remember! When I joined the PCC back in 2019, all the talk was of the tower and the application for a Faculty - I had to hit the ground running to find out the exact nature of the problems with the tower and what a Faculty even was!

For those of you who don't know, the church tower had been damp for many years. The PCC Minutes from 1925 make reference to the continuing damp in the tower, suggesting that the problem had been going on for quite a few years before that. It would seem that we have those pesky Victorians to blame for the damp. In the mid 1850s, extensive remodelling of the church was carried out, and as part of that the lime render was stripped from the building. Revealing the stone gave us the image of the church we have grown accustomed to today but this stone was never meant to be exposed to the Dales weather. The tower, at the west end of the church takes the full force of the rain that sweeps in from Cumbria.

During Rev Ann Chapman's time in Askrigg, the problem of the tower was raised, mainly due to the 2014 Quinquennial Inspection report, which highlighted the worsening issue. Inside, the tower was green and black with mould. Bell ropes and wooden flooring were rotting. Our church architect, Andrew Boyce, consulted widely on the problem and Historic England and the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings were very helpful with their advice and contacts. MaryRose Kearney, Chair of our Fabric Committee, has worked tirelessly to push this project forward and together with Andrew a plan was put forward to the Diocese of Leeds and the National Park for permission to re-render the tower.

This course of action was not universally accepted, even within our own PCC and congregation it took time to understand that this was the only long lasting resolution to the challenges faced. Over the following 6 years, with, of course, Covid in the mix too, the necessary permissions were sought and gained, money raised and tender documents issued. Three public meetings were held, so that the wider population had a better understanding of what was planned, and had a chance to ask questions.

Raising a not inconsiderable £250,000 was a daunting task. Grants were applied for – the National Lottery turned us down twice - but the Benefact Trust, the National Churches Trust, The National Park, the Wolfson and Headley Foundations came to our aid, as did the wonderful Jane Ritchie and the Elm House Trust. Many, many individuals and groups donated through a variety of fundraisers including Open Gardens, a silent auction of art arranged by the late Piers Browne and the infamous 5p collection jars!

Work finally started in June last year, when the scaffolding was erected and the clock removed for safekeeping. Since then, masons from Matthias Garn & Partners have worked tirelessly through sunshine, wind and rain. We have to say a special **BIG** thank you to all those living close to the tower, who have had to endure almost a year of flapping plastic, not to mention the noise of the drilling when they removed all the old cement and mortar!

And so, as I write, the clock has been reinstalled, the bells have been serviced, the finishing touches to the tower are being made and the rainwater goods are being replaced. The scaffolding is now down and we can see the tower in its new form. Yes it is different and may take some getting used to but it is already so much drier – so much so, that there is now dust rather than puddles in the ringing room. The main building is also drier and no longer smells musty. We hope you will come along and celebrate this new chapter with us, and help us to bless the tower for its next 500 years!

The Triumphal Entry: "The Lord needs it" (Mark 11:1-7 NIV)

I am struck by Jesus' demand: 'The Lord needs it.' May I draw your attention to five things?

First, *a demand from Jesus comes with authority*. We have nothing that is truly our own. All we have – even our lives – is a gift from God to us and can be demanded for his use.

Second, a demand from Jesus can be costly. Animals were valuable, especially a colt with a whole working life ahead of it. Nevertheless, at the words 'the Lord needs it', possession is handed over. We may think we have good uses for our resources. But if the Lord says, 'I need it', then the only wise thing is to give him what he demands.

Third, *a demand from Jesus needs no explanation*. Jesus doesn't say why he wants the colt; he just says, 'The Lord needs it.' He has the right to make demands without any justification. It's not our business to ask God to explain why he does actions or makes demands. To insist on an explanation is no longer to kneel before God on his throne but to seek to sit with him at a negotiating table. Explanations can wait; obedience can't.

Fourth, a demand from Jesus can come through his disciples. Jesus does not personally stride out and say, 'I demand this animal.' Instead, he sends his followers with his demand. Christ's authority for commands and demands – 'in my name' – can be delegated to his followers. Of course, this must not be abused but prayerfully evaluated.

Finally, a *demand from Jesus comes with a promise*. The text reads, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here shortly.' Jesus declares that he is not stealing this valuable animal, merely borrowing it. It will be returned. There will be a day when all we have given to God will be repaid in full – perhaps in this life but certainly in the next.
