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## From the Vicarage

It's been heartening to see and hear the rivers and becks tumbling with fresh water once again after the drought experienced through the summer months, but even after the recent downpours and dramatic pictures of flooding at Haylands Bridge reaching the national media, a lot more rain is needed before the hosepipe ban will be lifted!

One of the effects of the drought has been the 'stress' suffered by our local trees, encouraging them to shut down their external systems earlier than usual in a self-induced strategy for survival. To preserve water at their core, trees have been shedding branches and losing leaves earlier than usual making many of us think that autumn has arrived earlier this year.

External signs can be a helpful barometer and indicator as to what is going on in hidden places and there have certainly been plenty of such signs in our own nation in recent weeks to suggest that hidden tensions and anxieties are increasing and that stress fractures are beginning to show themselves. Indeed, the very reporting of such issues is adding to the problem with the World Health Organisation identifying the incessant 24/7 culture of revolving news creating what they are terming 'Media Overload'. Life in Wensleydale may often seem and feel removed from such cares and concerns, but they are real enough and close enough.

So; as Church, how are we supposed to respond? What can we do? ... PRAY.

Paul in his first letter to Timothy reminds and urges him and the early Church that: '... petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people <sup>2</sup> for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. <sup>3</sup> This is good, and pleases God our Saviour, <sup>4</sup> who wants all people to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth.'¹Tim.2:1ff

Worship and prayer draw us close to the Lord, to hear and know His will and to receive the strength we need to carry on. We are not called to shut down to preserve ourselves but to draw close to our source of Life and Refreshing. The imagery of the Old Testament prophet Jeremiah is helpful here as he encourages us to abide *in* and *with* God in worship and prayer that we might be like: '.. a tree planted by the waters, which spreads out its roots by the river ... its leaves will be green, sustained in drought and it will remain fruitful.' Jer. 17:7-8

Let's continue to give thanks for all the Lord has done, is doing and will do amongst us, with us and through us. We are not short of things to cry out to the Lord over but this should always be preceded with praise and thanksgiving for who He is. The Lord is sovereign – He rules and He reigns. Alleluia! Hold steadfast to his word and pray that through the challenges of these days that many will come to a 'knowledge of the truth'.

### Giving our Resources to God





# Some thoughts on Halloween

October and November mark several significant days in the Church's calendar:

- 'All Hallows', ('All Hallows Eve') Halloween, on October 31st,
- 'All Saints' November 1st, and
- 'All Souls' on Nov 2<sup>nd</sup>.

The word *Hallow* means Holy, so these are days when the church remembers and celebrates those who have lived their lives in faith as 'Disciples of Christ' - 'Allhallowtide'. In some cultures, people wandered the streets dressed as Saints, knocking on doors and exchanging sweet pastries with one another. It's not difficult to see how this custom has become adulterated with current Halloween activities of 'Trick or Treat'.

It is widely believed that many Hallowe'en traditions have evolved from an ancient Celtic festival called <u>Samhain</u> (pronounced 'Sow-in') which was Christianised by the early Church. Samhain is a Gaelic word meaning 'end of the summer'. This festival is believed to have been a celebration of the end of the harvest, and a time of preparation for the coming winter. Goodbye to the months of fruitfulness as people prepared to accept and embrace a season of sterility and barrenness.

It is now understood that the early church missionaries chose to hold a festival at this time of year to honour and to remember with gratitude the lives of Christians (saints) who have died, in order to absorb existing native Pagan practices into Christianity, thereby smoothing the conversion process. It became a tradition to hold a Vigil Mass on 'All Hallows Eve' which often included a visit to the churchyard where candles where left. These processional candles were often placed inside gourds to protect the flame from draughts.

The latter half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century saw the rapid commercialisation of Halloween into what has now become a celebration of the grotesque and the macabre and the costumes and images that are on display and for sale have become increasingly graphic causing many children's organisations to ask the question, 'When is scary, too scary?'. That said, the predominant attitude remains, that it is still a night of harmless fun for the children that never harmed anyone and those who consider it otherwise are labelled as 'Party Poopers' or 'Kill Joys'. I would like to advocate that fun and the truth can exist alongside one another and I remain concerned about how secular Halloween promotes four big lies.

#### Principally:

1) That evil is only external. Big teeth, claws, costumes, synthetic gore etc ... our children need to be informed that nasty characters do exist but that the really subversive evil comes from inside our hearts. We need to guard our hearts and lips and minds.

'Out of the heart come evil thoughts' Matt.16:19

2) That evil always looks ugly. Evil <u>is</u> ugly but a lack of personal beauty does not equate to evil. The most dangerous form of evil is when it's wrapped up in a nice



package and sadly this kind of subversive and duplicitous behaviour is on the increase. The Bible tells us that:

'satan masquerades as an angel of light' 2Cor.11:14

3) That evil is trivial. I understand why as a parent you might tell your child that the scary character at the door is nothing to be worried about, but when we do, we run the risk of minimising the power and danger of evil.

'Woe to those who call evil good and good evil, who put darkness for light and light for darkness' 1s.5:20


4) That evil cannot be defeated. One of the subtle messages that Halloween brings is that all you can do with evil is 'appease' it with an offering and hope that it will go away. As Christian's we know better. In the name of Christ, 'Resist the devil and he will flee from you' ames 4:7 We are made for victory - to do war with spiritual powers and principalities and we do well to reveal this spiritual truth to those we love and care for.

Let's not forget: Jesus said: 'I am the Light of the World' John8:12.

I am pleased to see how the Church in recent years has been working hard at reclaiming the real meaning of 'Halloween'. A celebration of that which is good and holy and wholesome. A celebration of Light.

As Church in the Upper Dale we continue to work with our local schools and families to keep the focus on celebrating this truth with fun activities such as 'Carve your Pumpkin Happy' competitions, fun songs, activities and parties that remember God's goodness, love and power.

Why not carve your pumpkin with a happy face this year? Light a candle, place it in a jar or lantern and have it shining out on your windowsill this Hallows Eve as a reminder of all the things we are grateful for.



More and more UK churches and their members are starting to be pro-active in combatting the sinister dangers of Halloween. Wouldn't it be wonderful if more and more of us started to do the same?
